



Observe your child's development from infancy on. The following are age appropriate behaviors for infants and toddlers. Does your baby...

### Birth to 4 months:

- 1. Awaken or stir at loud sounds?
- 2. Startle at loud noises?
- 3. Calm at the sound of a familiar voice?
- 4. Respond to your voice (smiles or coos)?

## 4 to 9 months:

- 1. Turn eyes toward source of familiar sounds?
- 2. Smile when spoken to?
- 3. Notice rattles and other sound-making toys?
- 4. Cry differently for different needs?
- 5. Make babbling sounds?
- 6. Seem to understand simple word/hand motions such as "bye-bye" with a wave?

# 9 to 15 months:

- 1. Babble a lot of different sounds?
- 2. Respond to his/her name?
- 3. Respond to changes in your tone of voice?
- 4. Say "ma-ma" or "da-da"?
- 5. Understand simple requests?

- 6. Repeat some sounds you make?
- 7. Use his/her voice to attract attention?

### **15-24 months:**

- 1. Point to familiar objects when they are named?
- 2. Listen to stories, songs and rhymes?
- 3. Follow simple commands?
- 4. Use several different words?
- 5. Point to body parts when asked?
- 6. Name common objects?
- 7. Put two or more words together?

#### **Preschool & Older:**

- 1. Turn up the volume of the TV excessively high?
- 2. Respond inappropriately to questions?
- 3. Not reply when you call him/her?
- 4. Watch others to imitate what they are doing?
- 5. Have articulation problems or speech/language delays?
- 6. Have problems academically?
- 7. Complain of earaches, ear pain or head noises?
- 8. Have difficulty understanding what people are saying?
- 9. Seem to speak differently from other children his or her age?

While these signs don't necessarily mean that your child has a hearing problem, they could be indicators of one.
